

That is certainly not the case now and it is going to get worse the closer we get the Christmas.

Bakerloo reps have asked the Train's safety Council to reraise this issue with LU. They cannot claim to be providing a Covid secure workplace and then expect drivers to work in packed saloon cars. This will be raised at an ad-hoc meeting this week.

In the meantime, drivers are covered under the refusal to work on the grounds of safety procedure. If its not safe, don't do it. The union will support anyone who refuses to work on the grounds of health and safety.

Beware at the PTI; be mindful of SPAD risks

Before Covid, the greatest risk of an incident on the trains was at the PTI. As passenger numbers rise again we are receiving reports from drivers of very busy platforms and people getting stuck or holding the doors open. This will only increase in the run to the festive season.

Passengers numbers have been low for a while so this is definitely an area where drivers should exercise greater caution.

If you cannot see the whole of the platform or train doors, do not move the train. Ask for assisted dispatch if necessary. Longer dwell time at platforms also causing blocking back at some locations; this in turn is casing SPAD traps for our drivers. Please be extra careful at these times.
